## Mythology by Edith Hamilton

Read and Annotate: Annotating is a tool of active reading which helps you understand and ask questions of a text. Underline key information, write notes about thoughts that occur to you in the margins, ask questions, and seek out answers. Use a pencil to have a conversation with the novel as you write.

Complete the following assignments: In ninth grade, you will study the ancient world in both history and literature. This will include the ancient peoples of Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece, and Rome. Edith Hamilton's *Mythology* examines and presents a numberfoline myths coming from these peoples. Read those myths and complete the following assignments:

- 1. Select one of the myths from Parts 13. Retell the myth in your own words in about 1 typed page.
- 2. Answer the following questions about Part 4:
  - a. What was the causeof the Trojan War?
  - b. Name someone who was destined to die in battle.
  - c. What saved Paris when he faced Menelaus in battle?
  - d. What saved Aeneas when he faced Diomedes in battle?
  - e. Why does Patroclus put on Achilles' armor? What happens to Patroclus because of its?
  - f. Who killed Hector? Why? Who finally got Hector's body for burial?
  - g. In her attempt to make Achilles invulnerable, what had his mother, Thetis, done when he was born?
  - h. Who got Achilles arms (armor)? What did that decision mean?
  - i. What famous trick was devised to get the Greeks into Troy?
